- 1.1-4: Prologue
- 1.5-4.13: Introductory Matters – Preparation for Jesus' Ministry
- 4.14-9.50: Jesus' Ministry in Galilee
- 9.51-19.27: Jesus Journeys to Jerusalem: Instruction, Mission, Healing, Controversy
- 19.28-21.38: Jesus' Ministry in Jerusalem
- 22.1-22.43: Jesus' Death and Resurrection
- 24.44-53: Conclusion

**Proper C22 = 19th Sunday after
Pentecost = Lectionary 27 = 7 October**

- *Occasions for stumbling > woe!*
- *Rebuking fellow sinners and forgiving sins, even 7x/day when repenting > "... You must forgive."*

⁶ The Lord replied,
"If you had faith the size of a mustard seed,
you could say to this mulberry tree,
'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,'
and it would obey you.

Is "growth" in faith assumed here?

Is Jesus encouraging or scolding the apostles?

Is uprooting trees a good idea?

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⁷ "Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field,

'Come here at once and take your place at the table?'

⁸ Would you not rather say to him,

'Prepare supper for me, put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink?'

⁹ Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded?

¹⁰ So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say,

'We are worthless slaves;
we have done only what we ought to have done!'"

Who among the apostles (or readers?) has slaves?

Is Jesus encouraging this kind of owner behavior? Slave behavior? Is he being ironic?
